### C. SIGNIFICANT NEXUS DETERMINATION

A significant nexus analysis will assess the flow characteristics and functions of the tributary itself and the functions performed by any wetlands adjacent to the tributary to determine if they significantly affect the chemical, physical, and biological integrity of a TNW. For each of the following situations, a significant nexus exists if the tributary, in combination with all of its adjacent wetlands, has more than a speculative or insubstantial effect on the chemical, physical and/or biological integrity of a TNW. Considerations when evaluating significant nexus include, but are not limited to the volume, duration, and frequency of the flow of water in the tributary and its proximity to a TNW, and the functions performed by the tributary and all its adjacent wetlands. It is not appropriate to determine significant nexus based solely on any specific threshold of distance (e.g. between a tributary and its adjacent wetland or between a tributary and the TNW). Similarly, the fact an adjacent wetland lies within or outside of a floodplain is not solely determinative of significant nexus.

The subject wetland is approximately 1300 feet from the shoreline of the TNW and within the 100-year floodplain of Redfish Bay.

For each of the following situations, a significant nexus exists if the tributary, in combination with all of its adjacent wetlands, has more than a speculative or insubstantial effect on the chemical, physical and/or biological integrity of a TNW. Considerations when evaluating significant nexus include, but are not limited to the volume, duration, and frequency of the flow of water in the tributary and its proximity to a TNW, and the functions performed by the tributary and all its adjacent wetlands. It is not appropriate to determine significant nexus based solely on any specific threshold of distance (e.g. between a tributary and its adjacent wetland or between a tributary and the TNW). Spring Creek, just downstream of the unnamed tributary is listed on the 303D list for bacteria and depressed dissolved oxygen. Chemically, these wetlands and impounded waters within the relevant reach sequester pollutants and nutrients as well as add organic carbon to the downstream food webs. Physically, these adjacent wetlands slow the velocity of the water thus reducing erosion, they temporarily store storm water and reduce the effect of flooding downstream. These wetlands and impounded waters located within the relative reach serve as floodplain storage of the downstream TNW. Biologically these wetlands and impounded waters provide habitat and lifecycle support functions for various organisms both vertebrates and invertebrates. These adjacent wetlands have more than a speculative and insubstantial effect on the chemical, physical, and biological integrity of the downstream TNW (Spring Creek).



**B. ADDITIONAL COMMENTS TO SUPPORT JD:** A desk review was conducted on 1 October and 23 October 2012, which included an investigation and review of the above documents listed in Section IV of the form. The 1995 IR aerial photos showed cooler signatures which can be indicative of hydrology. NWI indicates that there are freshwater emergent wetlands within the review area. A site visit conducted 2 October 2012 confirm the presence of a wetland that meet the three criteria (hydrology, hydrophytic vegetation, and hydric soils) as outlined in the Atlantic and Gulf Coastal Plain Region Supplement to the 1987 Corps of Engineers Wetland Delineation Manual. The wetland is part of a wetland complex and is abutting an ephemeral tributary of Decker's Branch. Therefore a significant nexus was evaluated for this wetland. The relevant reach is the entire length (approximately 3.2 river miles) of the unnamed tributary of Decker Branch. The unnamed tributary a 1st order non-RPW. This unnamed tributary flows ephemerally into Decker's Branch, a RPW and then into Mill Creek, a RPW and then into Spring Creek, a RWP that turns into a TNW. There are approximately 11 wetlands, totaling 7.7 acres, located within the relative reach that are adjacent to the tributary. A 17-acre impounded water of the tributary is also located in the relative reach. The 7.7 acres of wetlands, impounded water (approximately 17 acres), have more than a speculative and insubstantial effect on the chemical, physical, and biological integrity of the downstream TNW (Spring Creek) which is located 14.8 aerial-miles downstream from the project review area. Spring Creek, just downstream of the unnamed tributary is listed on the 303D list for bacteria and depressed dissolved oxygen. Chemically, these wetlands and impounded waters within the relevant reach sequester pollutants and nutrients as well as add organic carbon to the downstream food webs. Physically, these adjacent wetlands slow the velocity of the water thus reducing erosion, they temporarily store storm water and reduce the effect of flooding downstream. These wetlands and impounded waters located within the relative reach serve as floodplain storage of the downstream TNW. Biologically these wetlands and impounded waters provide habitat and lifecycle support functions for various organisms both vertebrates and invertebrates. 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


