Potentially jurisdictional waters and/or wetlands were assessed within the review area and determined to be not jurisdictional.

Explain: Based on review of available information and the 18 January 2017 site visit, we have determined that thirteen "isolated" wetlands (WET 1 thru WET 13; totaling appx 1.8 acres), existing on these two parcels. This site is divided into two parcels: one north (Wet 1 thru Wet 8; totaling appx 0.7 acre) and one on the south (Wet 9 thru Wet 13; totaling appx 1.07 acre). These two parcels are divided by a drainage ditch that runs east and west that is NOT part of the project area. These

wetlands were identified using the Atlantic and Gulf Coastal Plain Region Supplement to the 1987 Corps of Engineers Wetland Delineation Manual. These wetlands are located in a depression landscape position with precipitation as the primary source of hydrology.

WET 1 thru 8 (northern parcel) are located approximately 600 to 1,400 feet southwest of an unnamed Relatively permemeant water (RPW) that flows indirectly into Sims Bayou, the downstream TNW. They are also located approximately 150 to 500 feet north and west of a drainage ditch that bisects the tract;but is NOT in the project area. Based on site visit and review of off-site information we have verified that none of these wetlands not have a direct surface hydrologic connection to any water of the U.S. nor the aforementioned drainage ditch.

WET 9 thru 13 (Southern parcel) are located approximately 1,400 to 2,500 feet north of Sims Bayou, a RPW at this location that flows directly into a TNW (Sims Bayou). These wetlands are located approximately 1,000 to 2,100 feet south of a aforementioned drainage ditch noting there is also another drainage ditch outside the review area on the east side (outside the rveiw area). These southern wetlands are approximately 500 to 1,500 feet west of a the second drainage ditch mentioned. Based on site visit and our site review we have verified that none of these southern wetlands have a surface hydrologic connection to any waters of the U.S. nor either darinage drainage ditch.

We also reviewed the LiDAR data for both parcels and none of the wetlands in review are located within the mapped or anticpated elevatin that would be contiguous with the 100-year floodplain of Sims Bayou. SWG has determined that these wetlands are "isolated".

No nexus to interstare commerce was found and as such it is our draft determeiant that they are not waters of the United States, as defined in 33 CFR 328.3(a).

None of these wetlands are not currently used, or were used in the past, nor susceptible to use for interstate or foreign commerce.

None of these wetlands have a known nexus to interstate commerce.

None of these wetlands are not subject to the ebb and flow of the daily tide.

None of these wetlands cross interstate or tribal boundaries.

The destruction of any of these wetlands in review (intrastate wetlands) would affect interstate or foreign travelers for recreational or other purposes, would not affect fish or shellfish that could be taken and sold in interstate or foreign commerce, and would not affect the current use or potential use for industrial purposes by industries in interstate commerce.

None of these wetlands are impoundments of a water of the United States.

None of these wetlands are not part of a surface tributary system of any of the previous mentioned waters.

None of these wetlands are part of the territorial seas.

None of these wetlands are located "adjacent" to any waters identified in any of the above. "Adjacent" determination is based upon defintion in federal regulations at 33 CFR 328.3 c): bordering, contiguous, or neighboring.

None of the wetlands are located out of the 100-year floodplain of any water of the United States nor do they have a confined surface hydrological connection to any water of the United States. They are all located in an "isolated" (as defined in 33 CFR 330.2(e): those non-tidal waters of the United States that are not part of a surface tributary system to interstate or navigable waters of the United States, and are not adjacent to such tributary waterbodies) landscape position. None of these wetlands have been determined to be "ecologically adjacent"; as defined in the Rapanos guidance as being "reasonably close" such that an ecologic interconnectivity is beyond speculation and insubstantial and there are no known species in this georegion that require both the subject wetlands and the nearest waterbody (a water of the United States other than an adjacent wetland) to fulfill spawning and/or life cycle requirements. There is no known nexus to interstae commerce associated with any of these wetlands.

Therefore, these 13 wetlands are "isolated" and do not have a known nexus to interstate commerce. As such, they are not considered waters of the United States subject to federal jurisdiction under Section 404 of the Clean Water Act.

C. SIGNIFICANT NEXUS DETERMINATION

A significant nexus analysis will assess the flow characteristics and functions of the tributary itself and the functions performed by any wetlands adjacent to the tributary to determine if they significantly affect the chemical, physical, and biological integrity of a TNW. For each of the following situations, a significant nexus exists if the tributary, in combination with all of its adjacent wetlands, has more than a speculative or insubstantial effect on the chemical, physical and/or biological integrity of a TNW. Considerations when evaluating significant nexus include, but are not limited to the volume, duration, and frequency of the flow of water in the tributary and its proximity to a TNW, and the functions performed by the tributary and all its adjacent wetlands. It is not appropriate to determine significant nexus based solely on any specific threshold of distance (e.g. between a tributary and its adjacent wetland or between a tributary and the TNW). Similarly, the fact an adjacent wetland lies within or outside of a floodplain is not solely determinative of significant nexus.

B. ADDITIONAL COMMENTS TO SUPPORT JD: Based on review of available information and the 18 January 2017 site visit, we have determined that thirteen "isolated" wetlands (WET 1 thru WET 13; totaling appx 1.8 acres), existng on these two parcels. This site is divided into two parcels: one north (Wet 1 thru Wet 8; totaling appx 0.7 acre) and one on the south (Wet 9 thru Wet 13; totaling appx 1.07 acre). These two parcels are divided by a drainage ditch that runs east and west that is NOT part of the project area. These wetlands were

identified using the Atlantic and Gulf Coastal Plain Region Supplement to the 1987 Corps of Engineers Wetland Delineation Manual. These wetlands are located in a depression landscape position with precipitation as the primary source of hydrology.

WET 1 thru 8 (northern parcel) are located approximately 600 to 1,400 feet southwest of an unnamed Relatively permemeant water (RPW) that flows indirectly into Sims Bayou, the downstream TNW. They are also located approximately 150 to 500 feet north and west of a drainage ditch that bisects the tract;but is NOT in the project area. Based on site visit and review of off-site information we have verified that none of these wetlands not have a direct surface hydrologic connection to any water of the U.S. nor the aformentioned drainage ditch.

WET 9 thru 13 (Southern parcel) are located approximately 1,400 to 2,500 feet north of Sims Bayou, a RPW at this location that flows directly into a TNW (Sims Bayou). These wetlands are located approximately 1,000 to 2,100 feet south of a aforementioned drainage ditch noting there is also another drainage ditch outside the review area on the east side (outside the rveiw area). These southern wetlands are approximately 500 to 1,500 feet west of a the second drainage ditch mentioned. Based on site visit and our site review we have verified that none of these southern wetlands have a surface hydrologic connection to any waters of the U.S. nor either darinage drainage ditch.

We also reviewed the LiDAR data for both parcels and none of the wetlands in review are located within the mapped or anticipated elevatin that would be contiguous with the 100-year floodplain of Sims Bayou. SWG has determined that these wetlands are "isolated". No nexus to interstare commerce was found and as such it is our draft determeiant that they are not waters of the United States, as defined in 33 CFR 328.3(a).

None of these wetlands are not currently used, or were used in the past, nor susceptible to use for interstate or foreign commerce.

None of these wetlands have a known nexus to interstate commerce.

None of these wetlands are not subject to the ebb and flow of the daily tide.

None of these wetlands cross interstate or tribal boundaries.

The destruction of any of these wetlands in review (intrastate wetlands) would affect interstate or foreign travelers for recreational or other purposes, would not affect fish or shellfish that could be taken and sold in interstate or foreign commerce, and would not affect the current use or potential use for industrial purposes by industries in interstate commerce.

None of these wetlands are impoundments of a water of the United States.

None of these wetlands are not part of a surface tributary system of any of the previous mentioned waters.

None of these wetlands are part of the territorial seas.

None of these wetlands are located "adjacent" to any waters identified in any of the above. "Adjacent" determination is based upon defintion in federal regulations at 33 CFR 328.3 c): bordering, contiguous, or neighboring.

None of the wetlands are located out of the 100-year floodplain of any water of the United States nor do they have a confined surface hydrological connection to any water of the United States. They are all located in an "isolated" (as defined in 33 CFR 330.2(e): those non-tidal waters of the United States that are not part of a surface tributary system to interstate or navigable waters of the United States, and are not adjacent to such tributary waterbodies) landscape position. None of these wetlands have been determined to be "ecologically adjacent"; as defined in the Rapanos guidance as being "reasonably close" such that an ecologic interconnectivity is beyond speculation and insubstantial and there are no known species in this georegion that require both the subject wetlands and the nearest waterbody (a water of the United States other than an adjacent wetland) to fulfill spawning and/or life cycle requirements. There is no known nexus to interstae commerce associated with any of these wetlands.

Therefore, these 13 wetlands are "isolated" and do not have a known nexus to interstate commerce. As such, they are not considered waters of the United States subject to federal jurisdiction under Section 404 of the Clean Water Act.
