MEMORANDUM FOR RECORD

SUBJECT: US Army Corps of Engineers (Corps) Pre-2015 Regulatory Regime Approved Jurisdictional Determination in Light of *Sackett v. EPA*, 143 S. Ct. 1322 (2023),¹ SWG-2017-00231

BACKGROUND. An Approved Jurisdictional Determination (AJD) is a Corps document stating the presence or absence of waters of the United States on a parcel or a written statement and map identifying the limits of waters of the United States on a parcel. AJDs are clearly designated appealable actions and will include a basis of JD with the document.² AJDs are case-specific and are typically made in response to a request. AJDs are valid for a period of five years unless new information warrants revision of the determination before the expiration date or a District Engineer has identified, after public notice and comment, that specific geographic areas with rapidly changing environmental conditions merit re-verification on a more frequent basis.³ For the purposes of this AJD, we have relied on section 10 of the Rivers and Harbors Act of 1899 (RHA),⁴ the Clean Water Act (CWA) implementing regulations published by the Department of the Army in 1986 and amended in 1993 (references 2.a. and 2.b. respectively), the 2008 *Rapanos-Carabell* guidance (reference 2.c.), and other applicable guidance, relevant case law and longstanding practice, (collectively the pre-2015 regulatory regime), and the *Sackett* decision (reference 2.d.) in evaluating jurisdiction.

This Memorandum for Record (MFR) constitutes the basis of jurisdiction for a Corps AJD as defined in 33 CFR §331.2. The features addressed in this AJD were evaluated consistent with the definition of “waters of the United States” found in the pre-2015 regulatory regime and consistent with the Supreme Court’s decision in *Sackett*. This AJD did not rely on the 2023 “Revised Definition of ‘Waters of the United States,’” as amended on 8 September 2023 (Amended 2023 Rule) because, as of the date of this decision, the Amended 2023 Rule is not applicable in Texas due to litigation.

1. SUMMARY OF CONCLUSIONS.

3. REVIEW AREA. The review area 11.08 acres located at 0 Banks Street in Humble, Harris County, Texas. The center coordinates for the property are 29.998744°, -95.291438°. The previous AJD was completed on 26 July 2017. That AJD identified one isolated wetland approximately 0.5 acre in size.

8. NON-JURISDICTIONAL AQUATIC RESOURCES AND FEATURES

- a. Describe aquatic resources and other features within the review area identified as “generally non-jurisdictional” in the preamble to the 1986 regulations (referred to as “preamble waters”).⁷ Include size of the aquatic resource or feature within the review area and describe how it was determined to be non-jurisdictional under the CWA as a preamble water.

The pond (5.9 acres) is an old borrow pit left from the construction of FM 1960 and is, therefore, a preamble water. The 1986 preamble to 33 CFR 320-330 regulations state that “for clarification it should be noted that we generally do not consider the following waters to be waters of the United States... (e) Waterfilled depressions created in dry land incidental to construction activity and pits excavated in dry land for the purpose of obtaining fill, sand, or gravel unless and until the construction operation is abandoned and the resulting body of water meets the definition of the waters of the United States (33 CFR 328.3 (a))” Therefore, the lake is not a water of the United States subject to Section 404 of the Clean Water Act. Any discharge of dredge and/or fill material into the lake does not require a Department of the Army permit.

- b. Describe aquatic resources and features within the review area identified as “generally not jurisdictional” in the *Rapanos* guidance. After a desk review and a review of the current regulations, the wetland (0.50 acre) identified in the 2017 AJD does not meet the continuous surface connection standard for adjacent wetlands as it does not abut a relatively permanent water, a jurisdictional impoundment, or a traditional navigable water. Therefore, the wetland is not a water of the United States subject to Section 404 of the Clean Water Act. Any discharge of dredge and/or fill material into the wetland does not require a Department of the Army permit.
