#### C. SIGNIFICANT NEXUS DETERMINATION

A significant nexus analysis will assess the flow characteristics and functions of the tributary itself and the functions performed by any wetlands adjacent to the tributary to determine if they significantly affect the chemical, physical, and biological integrity of a TNW. For each of the following situations, a significant nexus exists if the tributary, in combination with all of its adjacent wetlands, has more than a speculative or insubstantial effect on the chemical, physical and/or biological integrity of a TNW. Considerations when evaluating significant nexus include, but are not limited to the volume, duration, and frequency of the flow of water in the tributary and its proximity to a TNW, and the functions performed by the tributary and all its adjacent wetlands. It is not appropriate to determine significant nexus based solely on any specific threshold of distance (e.g. between a tributary and its adjacent wetland or between a tributary and the TNW). Similarly, the fact an adjacent wetland lies within or outside of a floodplain is not solely determinative of significant nexus.

B. ADDITIONAL COMMENTS TO SUPPORT JD: Aerial photography indicates the review area is an impoundment of a natural tributary that had a direct hydrological connection to a TNW (Rio Grande). Historical topography indicates the current hydrological connection was excavated from the natural tributary that flowed into a TNW (Rio Grande). The impoundment (La Joya Lake) is used as a detention pond for agricultural purposes and as a water retention for flooding north of the review area. The review area also serves as an outlet for flooding into the TNW located south of the review area. Google Earth aerial photography indicates that there are observable features, such as an ordinary high water mark along with bed and bank of the impoundment. Per CFR 33 328.3(a)(4) all impoundments of waters that contain a hydrological connection to a jursdictional water (TNW) are considered waters of the United States. Online research photos indicate the presence of fresh water emergent wetlands along the natural shorelines within the lake and wetland vegetation, such as cattails (Typha angustifoli) were identified within the photos taken from within La Joya Lake.
